from Texas Accountants and Lawyers for the Arts also discussed topics to consider when negotiating contracts. During the afternoon, several Young Masters were presented with resolutions by their state legislators, commemorating their achievements.

In the evening, the <u>Texas Cultural Trust</u> (TCT) honored the 2018 Young Masters at an awards ceremony and star-studded concert at Austin's ZACH Theatre with honorary chair First Lady Cecilia Abbott and event chairs Ashley Covert, Gerardo Interiano, Maya Smart, and Natasa Valocchi. The evening featured special performances by Dallas Black Dance Theatre and 2016 Texas State Musician Joe Ely; Conspirare and Conspirare Youth Choirs, led by 2013 Texas State

Musician Craig Hella Johnson, performed an original composition by Allen Robertson to kick off the event. Past Young Masters award recipients Emma Colwell ('16, musical theater) and Behnam Arzaghi ('10, music) also performed, showing the heights they have reached as artists (so far) since receiving the Young Master designation and grant. Everest Pipkin ('08, visual arts) and San Antonio visual artist Cruz Ortiz discussed the role of the arts and arts education opportunities like Young Masters. TCA sends grateful appreciation to the Texas Cultural Trust for their work on the program and the event.

Young Masters is a grant program that provides exemplary art students in grades 8-11 with the financial help they need to pursue advanced study in the areas of visual arts, literary arts, music, theater, dance, musical theater, and media arts. This year's promising young students come from 11 cities and together display a variety of artistic talents. The fifteen 2018 Young Masters will be awarded grants of \$5,000 per year for two years to further their studies in their chosen arts disciplines-before college. This gifted group of artists represents the ninth class of Young Masters. Since the program's inception in 2002, the TCT and TCA have given 328 grants to 154 Young Masters, awarding \$932,500 to aspiring artists from across the state. The program received 315 applications for the November 15, 2017 deadline.

Texas Poetry Out Loud Winner at National Competition

Ariel Warren, Texas' 2018 Poetry Out Loud winner, competed in the national contest in Washington, DC, on April 24. The national competition starts with a day of three semi-finals broken up by region. The top three competitors in each semi-final move on to the next day's event: the national finals. The Poetry Out Loud recitation contest is a national project of the National Endowment for the Arts and the Poetry Foundation. High school students memorize poems and perform them in competition, mastering public speaking skills, building

self-confidence, and learning about their literary heritage along the way. The Texas Commission on the Arts conducts the program at the state level.

Ariel, who is completing her sophomore year at Harmon High School in Lewisville, recited "Domestic Situation" by Ernest Hilbert, "A Celebration of Charis: I. His Excuse for Loving" by Ben Jonson, and "What You Have to Get Over" by Dick Allen. Ultimately, South Carolina's <u>Janae Claxton</u> took the top prize of \$20,000 and bragging rights as the 2018 Poetry Out Loud national winner. Congratulations to Janae, Ariel, and the other students who represented their states on the national stage.
